Involving one client

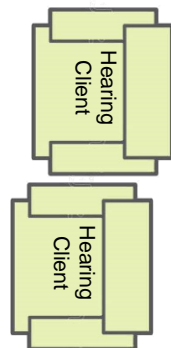
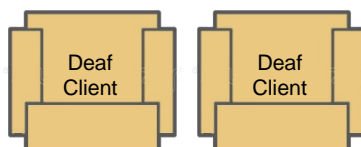
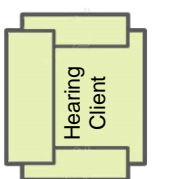
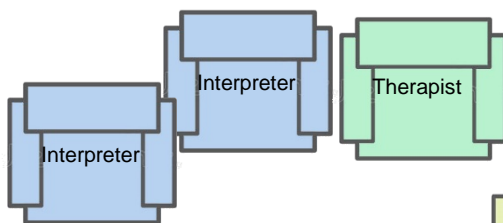


Involving one client and a CDI (Certified Deaf Interpreter)
